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President's Message

While attending the 2022 Leadership Meeting in Spring Louisville, Kentucky, spokesmen from the National Society outlined our society's five-year plan that had been designed and implemented in 2021. I showed this during our afternoon session at the State Conference in March, and I would like to repeat it here so that every chapter and member understands the direction that the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution is heading. I include this in the Liberty Bell because I want to enhance the communication between the National Society and local chapters. I will also note some areas I think chapters can move toward in preparation for our nation's 250th Anniversary celebration. The National Society called this the Five-Year Development Plan. The plan states our mission is "to become a major recognized voice of the American Revolution by educating America about our patriotic and historic past.

Seven goals were listed. I will list the seven goals and the

objectives that went with them. Goal #1-250th Anniversary: Enhance America's awareness/understanding of the American Revolution by the 250th Anniversary. Objective 1a: Complete and open to the public the SAR Museum by 2026. Objective 1b: Create a nationwide, multi-media public affairs campaign, including staffing recommendations for a professional public affairs group, for the 250th Anniversary of the American Revolution by 2022 with by implementation HQ. societies, and chapters by 2024. Objective 1c: Boost the public image of the Society as a lineage organization through technology investment and a focused marketing campaign of the Society's genealogical resources.

Goal #2–Patriotic Programs: Raise awareness of the SAR as a patriotic organization and reenergize America's sense of patriotism. Objective 2a: Increase local profile by showing the SAR's Colors. Objective 2b: Increase recognition of local governments, civil servants and volunteers. Objective 2c: Increase recognition of local veterans and veterans' organizations with an annual veterans' event.

Goal #3–Historical Programs: Make the American Revolution and "our" colonial history relevant again. Objective 3a: Partner with other heritage/preservation groups to post 250th Anniversary markers in your town by 2026. Objective 3b: Hold at least two 250th Revolutionary War programs or recognitions annually through 2033. Objective 3c: Partner with the DAR, C.A.R. and other groups to plan and execute a joint 250th celebration on the 4th of July 2026.

Goal #4–Educational Programs: Make the SAR a major source for online information on the American Revolution. Objective 4a: Develop an information campaign to inform local schools and related organizations about the SAR's

Educational Website and SAR Genealogical Research Library's online capability. Objective 4b: Appoint State Society Education Directors who will champion the SAR's Educational and Youth Awards Programs with their local schools. Objective 4c: Incorporate, where appropriate, 250th Anniversary themes into Youth Contests.

Goal #5—People: Aggressively grow and develop our membership and professional staff by the 4th of July 2026. <u>Objective 5a</u>: Appeal to their patriotism and core American values and principles, as described in public affairs campaign plan, to attract, train, involve, and retain members that aggressively grows our membership by the 4th of July 2026. <u>Objective 5b</u>: Build and retain a professional staff to meet the Society's future growth and goals.

Goal #6–Supporting Systems: Enhance and simplify administrative systems for societies and chapters.

Objective 6a: Streamline membership and dues collection process by the end of 2023.

Objective 6b: Enhance internal communications and eliminate redundant reports by 2023.

Goal #7 – Funding: Secure sufficient financial resources for our programs and for our goals. Objective 7a: Aggressively secure financial resources for top priority projects/programs by the end of 2025. Objective 7b: Initiate a comprehensive capital campaign.

I believe we can begin to implement several of these objectives already, especially those under goals Two (Patriotic Programs), Three (Historical Programs), and Four (Educational Programs). I am sure we will continue to discuss these objectives their implementation upcoming Board of Governor meetings.



Book Review

<u>Alexander Hamilton</u> by Ron Chernow

Noted historian and author Ron Chernow puts his considerable skills to the task of revealing and unraveling the myths and legends surrounding the incredible life of perhaps the most influential of America's founding fathers.

Alexander Hamilton is a tour de force of

America's founding and politics. Perhaps the least known of the founding fathers Alexander Hamilton's life and death are surrounded by myths and mysteries. Chernow goes to painstaking depths to give light to the often overlooked or unknown truths about Hamilton's life and death.

Starting with Hamilton's seldom explored childhood in the Caribbean islands which both drove and haunted him all of his life Chernow lays the foundation for what is to become one of the greatest lives in American history. While still a teen on the Caribbean Island of Nevis Hamilton began his prolific writing career by submitting poems to the local news paper. Hamilton continued to provide articles and columns for his local newspaper in Nevis throughout his career.

Friends and benefactors arrange for Hamilton's education in America where he became obsessed with the cause of American independence and a desire for military fame. Hamilton's intelligence was quickly noticed by the American commander George Washington who invited Hamilton to become a trusted member of his staff. This relationship served both men for the rest of their public careers.

As early as his time as Washington's chief of staff Hamilton began writing articles about how a new independent nation would function, many of Hamilton's ideas were adopted by other founding fathers and became the basis of the Constitutional government that we have today. Deriving rom his early days as a clerk on Nevis, Hamilton's primary interest were finance and commerce.

A delegate to the Continental Congress Hamilton helped draft the Constitution. To rally support for the Constitution Hamilton along with John Jay and James Madison authored as series of articles defining how the new Constitution would be implemented. "The Federalist Papers" were a political and financial success consisting of 85 separate articles on every subject of the Constitution they remain today the most important literature ever produced in American history.

Picked by then President Washington as the first Treasury Secretary of the newly formed Unite States, Hamilton focused his interest in finance and his extraordinary intellect on the problem of how to finance a new federal government. He developed plans for a national bank, customs and tax collection, including a Coast Guard and a series of light houses to protect shipping along America's coastline, and most importantly developing the national economic and monetary system still in use today.

Retiring from public office Hamilton took up a lucrative practice as a lawyer. During his law career Hamilton worked with and argued cases against fellow New York lawyer Aaron Burr. In one important case the murder trial of Levi Weeks, the first murder trial in US history to have the proceeding recorded, Burr and Hamilton proved that the defendant had viable alibies for his whereabouts at the time of the murder. The jury took only 5 minutes to return with a verdict of not guilty.

Hamilton stayed active in politics using his influence to sway Federalist politics for many years after leaving public office. One such effort was his attempt to sway Aaron Burrs election for New York governor. After loosing favor with President Thomas Jefferson, Burr's political future was uncertain. He decided to try to resurrect his pollical fortunes by running for governor of New York. Hamilton having a long aquaintence with Burr supported another candidate for the office. Rumor made it to Burr that Hamilton has used his influence against Burr's candidacy and had made disparaging comments about Burr at a private dinner.

Confronted with the comments Hamilton refused to deny that he had mad the comments nor would he apologize for the comments. This threw Burr into a rage who demanded an apology. When none came the two men entered into "a contest of honor" as duels were commonly called at the time. On a bright July morning in 1804 the two men met on the dueling ground in Weehawken New Jersey. Hamilton had expressed his intention not to fire at Burr but would not call off the duel. Burr fired at Hamilton causing him a mortal wound. Hamilton died the next day in Greenwich Village, New York from the wound.

Chernow goes on to describe the life of Hamilton's family after his death including his wife Elizabeth's charity work and her celebrity status in later years.

Overall the book is an impressive telling of one of the most incredible rags to riches stories in American history.

Membership

Contacting Members who have not paid their Annual Dues and Recovery of Dropped Members

Now is the time for members to work as a collective team at the chapter level to encourage members who have not paid their Annual Dues to do so as soon as possible. It is also encouraged for the chapters to contact and encourage former members who have allowed their memberships to lapse to return to the Sons of the American Revolution. It is a recurring topic of the Membership Committee, which meets quarterly, to discuss the importance of Retention of current members as well as Recovery of those members who have discontinued their membership, some leaving after becoming members and never attending a chapter meeting. All members of the Board of Governors, which includes all Chapter Presidents receive a report from the Kansas Society Membership Secretary that shows the status of membership of current and past Kansas Society members, along with contact information.

Recruiting is a primary objective for the National Society, State Society, and chapters, but most would agree that the process of becoming a member of the Sons of the American Revolution is onerous, now more than ever with the scrutiny placed on Record Copies submitted as evidence. It makes sense to implement practices at the chapter level to engage our members leading to retention. Additionally, it makes sense to work diligently to recover those who have left our ranks. The membership secretary reports that there are approximately 994 dropped members who are eligible to return to an active status. It is recommended that these individuals be contacted, the reason for their

departure identified, and convince them to remain active or return to an active status.

A critical date for membership is April 1 of each year, which is when members who have not paid their dues are automatically dropped from membership rolls by our Membership Secretary as per the Kansas Society Handbook Volume II: Processing and Administrative Instructions. Every chapter president receives a renewal report from the membership secretary. Also in the handbook are the responsibilities of the Chapter Membership Committee which "is responsible for programs to recruit new members and to increase retention of existing members by reducing drops and resignation is and publicizing the results for chapter officers and members. Each year the committee sets specific goals to realize these objectives." It is highly recommended that each chapter membership committee, or Executive Committee, divide the list of unpaid and dropped members and call them. Some chapters visit their members at home or at work, while others call or email. The Membership Secretary contacts each of these members via a letter sent through the United States Postal Service, but it often takes a personal connection at the chapter level to retain or recover members.

In closing, it is again recommended that each chapter connect with their members who have not paid their Annual Dues and those who have dropped to return to an active status. Once they return, we ask that the leadership of the chapter reflect upon the challenges set forth by Kansas Society President Vern Welkner's 2021 Annual Conference speech that includes the engagement of all members, especially those who we recover, so they will be invested in their chapter and the mission of the Sons of the American Revolution.

When Dr. Ray Allen, Vice President of the Col. John Seward Chapter of the Kansas Sons of the American Revolution related in the Chapter's November 2021 meeting he attended a Fourth of July Parade in Hutchinson last summer, it sparked the idea for a parade in Liberal.

The CJS members began the process of organizing a parade in tandem with their sisters from the local Daughters of the American Revolution Chapters, and the event took root.

Chapter Publicity Chairman Earl Watt was assigned the task of organizing the event since he had organized the annual Christmas Parade for the Leader & Times newspaper for the past 22 years, but it soon became apparent that the event could not be contained to a parade.

"Not long after we decided to plan a Fourth of July Parade, local resident Doug Munsell came in to discuss an idea for a Fourth of July day in Light Park, with snow cones, bouncy houses and other events for the family," Watt said. "I contacted Munsell and told him about our plans for a parade. We met to form a committee, and since that time, local volunteers have joined the effort, and the Fourth of July Committee now has more than 10 members representing a diversity of groups in the community."

Volunteers from the city's Parks and Recreation Department quickly secured bouncy houses, an electric bull, a DJ and more. Other committee volunteers brought talent for historic readings as well as live bands, and others secured vendors including food trucks, shaved ice distributors and more.

Others have been calling in to participate in the parade, and the event has been approved by the City of Liberal to have a parade at 10 a.m. July 4 that will end in Light Park, and the park will be used for the festival until 3 p.m.

Additional exhibitors will be on hand to sell arts and crafts and other patriotic materials, and there will also be local volunteers registering people to vote.

The theme for the event is "Liberty and Justice for All," and it has been embraced by the community which has no historic record of having a Fourth of July parade.

"We believe it is our mission to tell the story of the United States, its founding, and its contributions to the advancement of all people," Watt said. "This is our way of contributing to the community while sharing just how important the sacrifices made for freedom and liberty have been and continue to be."

Other events are still being added, and the Col. John Seward Chapter of KSSSAR invites the state and national members to attend if possible to celebrate the founding of the United States of America. Participants welcome (especially Color Guard members. Ha).

The parade will begin on Kansas Avenue at 10 a.m., and introductions and presentations will take place at the pavilion in Light Park following the parade including patriotic readings, music, local dance teams and more. Live bands, games, attractions, vendors, a food court and more will be on hand until 3 p.m., and the annual

Liberal Bee Jay baseball game at the college concludes the evening with first pitch slated for 7 p.m. The annual fireworks extravaganza will begin immediately after the game behind the outfield.


