# President's Message

Compatriots, I recently returned from the $132^{\text {nd }}$ Congress of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution held at Savannah, Georgia, and I witnessed a historic event for the Kansas Society. On Monday night, July 11, Linda and I attended the annual oration contest at the Hyatt Regency. The Kansas Society contestant, James Schultz that had been selected as one of the top six Rumbaugh Oration contestants in the nation. Linda and I sat with Amy Schultz, James' mother and watched as each of the six finalists presented their orations. During the competition round of the Rumbaugh Oration, the contestants' names are not given; they are identified only by the number (one to six)
chosen at random. No applause is allowed during the competition. After the six contestants completed their orations and the judges were conferring to choose the winner, each contestant stood before the audience and told us about their backgrounds and future ambitions. Then the moment came when the judges' decision was ready.

This year, the competition was so close that three contestants shared fourth place. That had never happened before. James was not one of those, so we knew he was in the top three. Then the name of the third place was read, and again, since it was not James, we knew he was in the top two. When the second-place winner was declared, we knew James Schultz from the Kansas Society had won first place in the National Rumbaugh Oration contest. This is a great moment for all Kansas compatriots. Special congratulations are due to Bruce Smith, the Kansas Society's Rumbaugh Oration Committee Chairman for a good job well done. Compatriot Smith guided the oration contest from the state level and prepared James, the state winner, for the national contest. This task included making a video of James' oration and sending it to the National Rumbaugh Oration Contest Committee. By the way, James won \$10,000.00
for his oration, money that will help to pay for his college education.

The Kansas Society also had contestants in the National Elementary School Poster Contest, the Sergeant Moses Adams Middle School Brochure Contest, and the George and Stella Knight National Essay Contest. Each one did very well. Congratulations to all who participated. I am hoping that, in addition to entering into these youth contests, in 2023 we will enter contestants in the National Enhanced JROTC Contest, the Arthur M. and Berdena King National Eagle Scout Scholarship Contest, and the Dr. Tom and Betty Lawrence American History Teacher Award.

In addition, former state president Brooks Lyles became a general officer for the National Society as the Historian General. He has also been promoted to National Color Guard Commander. He was also presented in this year's class of Minuteman Award recipients (only six of these are awarded each year). Congrats, Brooks.

Finally, I had the honor of being elected as a general officer for the National Society. I will serve a one-year term as the Chaplain General. I am privileged to serve the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

## $132^{\text {nd }}$ National Congress

The road to Savanna crossed half of these United States and ended in the splendid city of Savannah, GA. Savannah is one of our most historic cities from the Revolution and we found it a great place for the Kansas Society SAR to shine.

President Vern Welkner was elected by a large margin to be the Chaplin General of the NSSAR. Vern was really a fine choice as it was a contested election and our president did a fine job taking the reins in his new position taking over

All of the contestants were good but none of them had Bruce Smith for a coach and Ashley Null to sit next to at dinner to get him to totally relax. By the way he also placed $5^{\text {th }}$ in the Knight Essay Contest. What a great young man to represent Kansas in the youth programs.

Our past recording secretary Gary Neal received one of the first Silver Liberty Medals and he is now the Registrar for the Maryland Society.

The congress did, however, end with a tragedy. Host Society Georgia's President passed away the day after Conference from an apparent heart attack brought on by covid. It seems that many others were being affected by this disease including but limited to PG Guzy and Karin, PG Manning and Sheila, our own VP Bryan Wampler, Orations Chairman Bruce Smith and many others so we are told. This really put kind
of a damper on what was the best conference we have attended and hope that this stuff will be gone next year.

Over all it was a great time and hope many of you will go to Orlando next year.


The Kansas Society was well represented at the 132nd Annual Congress in Savannah. Harry Wilklow, former President of the Henry Leavenworth Chapter and his wife were there from Orlando and Kansas Society VP Bryan Wampler and his wife attended the whole Congress before leaving to head home that morning Trustee Bobbie Hulse and his wife Debbie and Tim Peterman were there to see former President Brooks Lyles and Diane inducted as Historian General and President Vern Welkner and Linda inducted as Chaplain General . Kansas has never had two Compatriots serving as General Officers at the same time before. The future is bright for the Kansas Society as they continue to shine brightly in the National Society.

# Membership 

John Schatzel KSSSAR Genealogist

S AR accepted 7 Kansas applications this week, brining our membership to 984 with 25 on track for review by Thanksgiving.

Several KS compatriots participated in the Genealogy Committee Zoom on Monday and the Genealogist General's Zoom on Tuesday.

A few notes:
1- SAR applications approved after 1 Jan 2012 have the same credibility as DAR applications approved after 1 Jan 1985. In both cases, flagged records are not acceptable if the flag relates to the patriots service or applicant's lineunless you can resolve the flagged issue

2- All applicants must have a BC listing MALE.
3- Do not place on the application any information which is not documented. Two examples: 1) if you list an applicant's wife, you must include documentation such as a birth or marriage record. 2) if a DC lists a person's death in a county (such as Shawnee) do not list the city (Topeka) unless it is on the DC (or other documentation, such as an obit). Likewise, if an obit lists the death in Topeka, do not list the county unless you also include a DC (or will etc) listing the county. Though obvious for Topeka today, some cities, counties and states have changed (West Virginia, Maine etc) and the place listed should match the time of the event (birth, marriage, death).

4- The GG is developing a checklist which preparers can use to prepare applications. This may be required at some point, but should not be required until the policy, preparers manual and checklist have the same standards.

5- The SAR genealogy staff is full and working to review applications quickly. Though each genealogist can review a complete application
in less than an hour (and family plans, some supplementals and those linked to current DAR and SAR records faster), incomplete packets, illegible documents, unproven entries and poorly marked or sequenced documents delay the process. Consequently, genealogists spend a lot of time looking for information in the packet before bracketing, search online for information to allow approval, write many long notes detailing pended applications, and answer calls and emails from applicants and chapters. As a reminder, if you receive a pended notice, you should communicate with the applicants and Tim rather than the staff, and should not pass the staff's contact information to the applicant.

I review many pended applications for the Committee of Assistance and am proud to say that we have very few pended application.

Applications are often pended in groups, putting lots of money on the line. A few suggestions:

1. Do not submit family plans for questionable lines. (get one approved and then submit the rest as a family)
2. Do not submit more than one supplemental for a questionable line. (prove the questionable point using one supplemental and then submit other related supplementals)
3. When possible, submit the longest line for questionable applications (submitting for a grandson may give many more replacement patriots if the application to the original patriot is pended)
