It is a tribute to the many Society members who tackle the tough job of completing new member applications. Many of our chapters are seeing an increase in attendance at meetings and that, too, is good news. I believe the Kansas Society will go over the one thousand member mark and stay there! I regards to membership applications and supplementals, I have heard from the National Society that the genealogists are

improving their turn-around times and that should be good news for all of us.

Also from National, work continues on the National SAR Museum. Contributions are appreciated to help finance this project. This years National Society's Congress will be held in Orlando, Florida, July 15-20, 2023. You can register for Congress on the National Society's web site.

I am looking forward to our State conference on March 17-18. Plans are being made to have workshops that will benefit your chapter. We will also have President General Bruce Pickette's personal representative at the conference. I will be a great weekend!

I urge you to mark your calendar's for May 6. On that day, the Washington Chapter in the Wichita area, will have the second Patriot Grave Marking in Kansas history. More details are forthcoming.

Please allow me to recommend two books to you. Jeff Shaara wrote a bestselling trilogy on the Civil War. He is now writing on the Revolutionary War, and his first volume is entitled, Rise to Rebellion: A Novel of the American Revolution. I am almost finished with it and it has been a very good read. I am looking forward to his other works on the Revolution. While I was a Fall Leadership in September, Surgeon Keith Weissinger General recommended a book I find very useful. It is by Robert Morgan and its title is 100 Bible Verses That Made America: Defining Moments That Shaped Our Enduring Foundation of Faith. The book contains one hundred short vignettes that show how verses from the Bible shaped America at various times in our history. I think you will find reading this book will be time well spent.

Tim McCall's Labor of Love

Tim McCall loves history, and he also loves art. So, he combined the two passions in an unusual project – creating a replica of a pre-Revolutionary War drum, which he played during the Manhattan Veterans Day parade to help his Sons of the American Revolution chapter march in cadence.

"I love artistic challenges," said McCall, the pastor of Immanuel Lutheran Church in Junction City.

The drum project began about three weeks before the Nov. 11 parade when McCall stumbled upon a drum for sale online that was advertised as being like those used in the Revolutionary War. The drum caught his attention and he said: "I went down a rabbit hole." Eventually, he found a video on YouTube from the U.S. Army Museum that showed a Revolutionary War snare drum that looked like the one online.

What most intrigued him in the video was that the drum, made around 1750, had a pine tree motif painted on it, a symbol of the Massachusetts Bay colony, and below the motif, written in Latin, was the phrase: "It is sweet and proper to die for one's country."

McCall thought that if he bought the drum online, he could paint the same motif and create a replica of the Revolutionary War-era drum.

"I thought, 'that could be kind of a cool project,'" McCall said.

He purchased the drum and began the intricate process of painting the motif. The attention to detail required would overwhelm most people, but McCall has a fine arts degree and said he has a talent for painting.

The hardest part, he said, was figuring out the design itself. He took a screen shot of the drum in the video and enhanced the image to see the details of the motif.

Using acrylic paints, he patiently reconstructed the motif along with the Latin phrase.



"It took a while for each painting session to dry. So, I worked late at night while my young kids and wife slept," McCall said.

Once he finished the painting, McCall still wasn't satisfied.

"I wanted to make it look like it had gone through some battles," McCall said. "I had to strategically put in nicks and bumps. I smeared coffee grounds onto it and scratched it up."



The result was a drum that is remarkably like the museum piece.

"I don't know that it is an exact reproduction, but it doesn't really matter," said McCall.

In the 18th century, drums were used on the battlefield not only for music but as a means of communication. On a noisy battlefield, it was difficult for soldiers to hear commands, so certain drumbeats indicated commands such as "attack" or "retreat."

Drummers were often young boys or older men, which is why the term "Drummer Boy" came into use. The drummers were often on the frontlines, exposing themselves to enemy fire.

McCall joined SAR along with his father George because of his love of history and, as a way to share something with his father. He researched his family history and confirmed stories from his father that he had an ancestor involved in the Revolutionary War, Captain Michael Dayton of the Connecticut militia.

The genealogist for Kansas SAR researched the ancestry of McCall's 6-year-old adopted son Kalel and found that he also had a Revolutionary War ancestor, Samuel Doxey of New York.

"I was so very happy to discover that," said McCall, because it means he can share the SAR experience with his son. McCall and his wife Jennifer also have a 3-year-old daughter Amira.

In preparation for the Veterans Day parade, he researched the clothes that militia wore during the Revolutionary War period and even looked at the last will and testament of his ancestor for clues. He wore a brown coat with yellow pants and white, knee-length socks along with a tri-corned hat.



McCall isn't sure how many hours he spent on the drum project but considered it a labor of love.

"It made me feel connected to the past," McCall said.

Delaware Crossing Chapter Host US Senator Roger Marshall, MD

The topics on which Senator Marshall spoke at our January 21, meeting, were very informative and educational.



His presentation actually began with two of his staff members explaining their roles. Trey Martin, on the Senators left in the photo, in his role as District Representative spoke of monitoring taxes and their effect on citizens and keeping the Senator informed of those effects. Tyler Mason, Military Liaison, a veteran himself, positioned on the Senators right. Spoke about monitoring the needs of and the various programs for our nation's military veterans with respect to existing programs that need changes, new programs needed and informing veterans of both.

The Senator spoke next. His presentation was very full and comprehensive of the legislation making its way through Congress and his role with some of it as a Senator interacting with members of his own political party and that of the other political parties. He did offer his professional opinion; but sparingly. Very little "us versus them" political positioning was in his presentation; most did not come until the questioning period at the end of his presentation.

Washington Chapter Prepares for Patriot Memorial Marking



I am pleased to announce that on Saturday May 6, 2023 a ceremony will be held in the Rose Hill Cemetery outside of South Haven, Kansas to dedicate the Memorial Grave markers for Colby Creed, a veteran of the American Revolution, and his son, John Austin Creed, a veteran of the Indian Wars. The Kansas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution will be placing a patriot grave marker next to the marker of Colby Creed. We will also recognize the service of John Austin Creed who fought in the Black Hawk war of 1832.


