saac Barney Ellis (April 19, 1925 - June 10, 2025), past Kansas State Society President, Vice President General and recipient of the Minuteman Medal, the highest award issued by the Sons of the American Revolution, passed from this life to eternity on June 10, 2025.

He was a member Delaware Crossing Chapter & Monticello Chapter and a Life Member of both National SAR and Kansas SAR.

The Kansas Society of SAR said farewell to one of its favorite sons last month. Isaac Barnett "Barney" Ellis passed away on Tuesday afternoon, 10 June 2025, just months after his 100th birthday. Family and friends were with him.

Barney was a remarkable man who influenced the lives of many. He is fondly remembered for walking up on the left side of a compatriot, firmly taking hold of his bicep, and emphatically saying how the man was going to help the SAR. It was a great mentoring method that resulted in him turning a large number of members into leaders.

He was born in the family home in Walker, Missouri, attended Walker schools, and found success in high school that resulted in leadership positions. He attended a business school in Sedalia, Missouri, following high school graduation, but returned to teach high school as male teachers were going off to War. At that same time, he was overseeing a segment of the food rationing program. While he waited for his US Navy V-12 program application to be processed, he attended Missouri Valley College, Northwestern University and Harvard Business School where he received his BS degree. Most of his V-12 college education was at Northwestern University, completing the program at Harvard. Following graduation in 1943, he was commissioned as a US Navy Ensign in 1945 and deployed to Guam, serving there until June 1946.

Barney returned from the War to marry his college sweetheart, Virginia, starting their family in the Kansas City area. His business career commenced as an auditor, earning a CPA and shepherding his blossoming career.



While teaching at Central Business College, Sedalia, Missouri, Barney earned his Certificate in Public Accounting (CPA) at Kansas City, Missouri. He was employed by W. S. Dickey Company, serving as an accountant and finishing his career as president of the Company. His experience included forming a foundation for a hospital and then becoming president of Pitt Plastics in Pittsburg, KS.

Prior to retirement, he oversaw fundraising for a major hospital project in Joplin, Missouri, which would become useful for future endeavors. Retirement found him joining the Kansas SAR. Once again, he moved up the ranks. He went from president of the largest chapter in the Kansas SAR to state president to Vice President General. He sponsored about 250 men into SAR and helped start multiple chapters. That fundraising experience was put to work in the SAR Foundation, where he was elected president. He attended many Leadership meetings and Congresses. Barney received the Minuteman award in 2008.

Barney will be sorely missed and remembered for his inspirational leadership. Fair winds and following seas to a member of the Greatest Generation. He was a resident of Foxwood Springs, Raymore, MO. He was born to Isaac S. Ellis and Wiltsee Potter Ellis of Walker, Missouri.

His wife, Virginia Hoffman Ellis, his parents and a son, Randall Ellis (Teri) of Tulsa, Oklahoma, all preceded him in death. He is survived by two sons - Dale Ellis (Kathleen), Overland Park, KS; James Ellis (Melody), Wichita, KS; four grandchildren: Isaac Ellis, Overland Park, KS, Rebecca Ellis (Overland Park), Kathleen Misek (Ryan), Crown Point, IN and Sandra Ellis (Luke), Bella Vista, AR as well as six grandsons and two granddaughters.

He and Virginia were active in the Disciples of Christ Churches wherever they lived. He was a Boy Scout Volunteer for 42 years and served in various local, district and regional positions. He was recognized for service in BSA, awarded medals for the Silver Antelope and Silver Beaver medals. He was also active in the Sons of the American Revolution again, serving in chapter, state, district and national positions.



Barney's main hobby was Genealogy and he became State Genealogist for the Kansas SAR. He completed over 300 applications for other people. His service was recognized by the national SAR awarding him the Minute Man Medal.

A graveside service with military honors was held at Newton Cemetery, Nevada, MO, where his parents, wife and her parents are buried on Monday, June 16, 2025.

This foundation provides compassionate and confidential assistance to residents who have outlived their resources. Barnett was very active in fundraising and operations of this foundation for many years.

He was fully dedicated to the mission of the SAR and his legacy will live on.

Kansas SAR President's Message

s many of us enjoy the summer weather, the Kansas Society, SAR remains active and focused on several things. Since being installed as your Kansas Society President, I have endeavored to visit several chapters: Bennington, Charles Robinson, Delaware Crossing, Henry Leavenworth, Monticello, and Washington. Since several chapters don't meet during the summer, my plan is to continue chapter visits in the fall when meetings resume. Many chapters are involved in various patriotic activities during the summer and fall from Color Guard in parades to outreach booths in county or town festivals. I encourage the team of District Advisors to continue to look for and foster SAR activity in various community events. If members are planning to be involved, representing SAR in public, I encourage them to take Youth Protection Training at NSSAR. I did this on May 11 of this year. What is the purpose of outreach? To introduce the public to SAR. Considering that millions of non-members have Revolutionary War patriot ancestors, our hope is that people will choose to apply for SAR membership. We also hope that more of the youth will get involved in the variety of youth contests that SAR hosts. The measure of outreach success is an increased flow of applications or participation in youth contests.

How does a member do outreach? Volunteer to serve in the Color Guard for parades. Man outreach booths in community events. Talk about SAR within your personal network. Hand out SAR stuff when interacting with the public. Gather names and contact information. There is not a



pre-determined model that works. I encourage all members to be innovative. Think outside of the box. Share your ideas with other members. Test different approaches. Discuss your success stories and your failures. We don't want anyone to re-invent the wheel and then discover that they have perfected a flat tire. Listen to others. Be respectful of others.

Based on the Kansas Society membership count of January 1, 2025, we have 921 primary members that entitles Kansas to have 21 delegates at the SAR's National Congress this year. That event will be held in Uncasville, CT. Delegates to the Congress will get the opportunity to vote on a lot of noteworthy things, such as dues increases, application fee increases, modifications to the NSSAR Constitution and Bylaws, as well as the election of national officers. Congress involves many more activities, such as committee meetings, luncheons, banquets, and tours of noteworthy, historic locations. I encourage everyone to attend at least one Congress. Two members of the Kansas Society will be running for national office, from the floor, at the Uncasville Congress. What that means is that they will be running in contested races against someone endorsed by the senior leadership, so getting there to support them is of paramount importance. The names of all proposed delegates had to be reported to NSSAR by May 16, 2025. I am sad to report that over half of our delegate slots will be unfilled. If any significant changes are made at the Congress, you will learn about them in the next Liberty Bell or SAR Magazine.

As the summer wears on, we need to begin thinking about 2026 dues. The portal will open for payment in mid-August and I encourage all to renew online in August or September. Don't overlook contributions to the various funds for both the Kansas Society and your chapters. The cost of postage is increasing again, from 73 cents per stamp to 78 cents per stamp in July 2025. Most of us have noticed that the quality of mail delivery has declined over the last few years. With the portal, you don't need to worry about any of that. Paper notices will be mailed to the unpaid in September & October.

I encourage renewing members to consider purchasing a Life Membership. This can be done online using the portal, if you want to use a credit card. They can also be purchased by check using regular mail. The schedule of Life Membership prices (which are on an age-declining scale) can be found immediately following the Color Guard section in this Liberty Bell. This schedule is subject to change, depending on whether the National Congress makes the increase a reality.



I look forward to seeing many of you at the Board of Governors meetings in August and November, and at the various chapter meetings that I attend this fall.

First, and foremost, the 135th Annual National Congress took place this month (12 July - 17 July) at the Mohegan Sun Resort in Uncasville, Connecticut. Several hundred compatriots, accompanied by their ladies and some children attended. The Kansas Society was represented with 9 compatriots. If you want to absorb the full SAR experience, and if you have not yet attended one of these gatherings, mark your calendars for next July and join us to learn some South Carolina history. I attended this year as a Green Dot, marking me as a first-time attendee. We had our own orientation and joined in a group photo. I volunteered to help on my first day there and met some wonderful compatriots from numerous states. Wouldn't ya know, my day captain is a retired Marine Sergeant Major. We got along great! You will see there's no shortage of volunteers, as the host Connecticut Society handed out red polo shirts to all volunteers. They gave us each a \$50 gift card, too! There was no shortage of volunteers throughout the Congress. I attended the business meeting sessions as well as the Memorial Service, voted on some bylaws amendments and heard some great speeches. Our own Chaplain General Vern Welkner, and Bishop Ashley Null made presentations. Zach Distel, Curator and Director of Collections, gave a talk about Connecticut's involvement in the Revolution. Quite interesting, as the state was known as the Provision State – supplying the Continental Army with many needs from food to weapons and



powder. Connecticut Governor Trumbull was the only Royal Governor who remained true to the cause of independence throughout the eight years of war.

Tours included Fort Griswold, Mystic Seaport, Peqout Museum, War Office and Trumbull House. Much recognition and many awards were handed out, too numerous to track here. The Color Guard was colorful, and fantastic. With four drummers keeping a steady march beat and the fifers adding a colonial flair to their step, the Color Guard carried approximately 40+ flags. I think these brothers must have been professional musicians. It was quite the site and sound to behold.

Meetings and workshops included C.A.R., Family Tree Maker, Educational Outreach, South Central District Breakfast, GWEF Luncheon, America's 250 SAR Committee, Budget and Finance Committee to much pageantry. It was both inspirational and informative. Come to the next BOG to learn more, as several BOG members attended and will be giving their own reports.

Topping the list of highlights for the Kansas Society was that T. Brooks Lyles [North Carolina Society] was elected in a hotly contested race to be our next Treasurer General. Brooks won by a single vote out of 235 and he hit the ground running. William Allen Greenly, [Georgia Society], was elected Secretary General, and Michael J. Elston, [Virginia Society], is now our President General. Gary O. Green, [North Carolina Society] is now our Genealogist General. Also, for the year 2025-2026, Bryan Wampler [Monticello] was installed as Trustee, with Jeffrey Winters [Monticello] becoming an Alternate Trustee. Phil H. Hunt [Oklahoma Society] was installed as Vice President General for the South-Central District. Exciting things are anticipated with this strong leadership team!

Our next BOG meeting will be held on Saturday, 2 August, at the American Legion in Manhattan. We'll need to know how many will attend, for planning purposes.

leave you with the following short story I was inspired to write as my wife and I departed Congress and headed for home. It's printed in the old style but with modern-day English. Hope you'll enjoy it.

I settled back in the worn leather of my rented car, with the mid-day sun drenching the plush green trees of the Connecticut countryside. A member of the Sons of the American Revolution for only three years, I feel a profound connection to this land, a living testament to the birth of this nation. My Patriot ancestor was born, lived and enlisted just a few miles west in Haddam. He served as an Artillery Artificer throughout the eight grueling years of war and fought in most major battles as part of several Continental Artillery Regiments. Today's drive, from the SAR Congress just concluded at Mohegan Sun, back towards T. F. Green Airport in Providence, evoked strong feelings and stirred the ghosts of revolution in my mind's eye. Join me in thinking about what your Patriots must have experienced.



We passed a field near Voluntown, the new grass shining with a vibrant green, and in that instant, the mundane faded. The field transformed before me. I saw not the neatly fenced pasture, but a ragged line of Continental soldiers, their brown homespun compatriot militia alongside, a stark contrast to the scarlet coats advancing in their direction across the same ground.

Muskets reared, the acrid smell of gunpowder filled the air, a phantom scent that made me inhale sharply. I imagined the fear in the young colonial faces against the disciplined might of the British regulars. Determination etched on the brow of a farmer-turned-soldier as he stood his ground and rolled that canon ball down the barrel of his six-pound gun. BOOM! It's 1778 and the British have realized that Connecticut is known as the provision state for a reason. The locals provide food, munitions, weapons, clothing, men and supplies for George Washington's Army.

Further along, a gentle rise in the land became a strategic hill, now dotted with hastily assembled colonial militia. I pictured them behind makeshift barricades of stone walls, picking off redcoats as



they struggled uphill. I could almost hear the sharp crack of their rifles, so different from the disciplined volleys of the British muskets. In a valiant attempt to make their impact, I envisioned a young officer on the flank, barely more than a boy, rallying his men, his voice hoarse but filled with patriotic intensity.

We rounded a bend, and the tranquis Thames River, flowing gently beneath an old stone bridge, morphed into a scene of desperate retreat. The colonial soldiers, ranks broken, scrambled across the bridge, pursued by bayonet-wielding British troops. The splash of boots in the water, the cries of the wounded – it was all so vivid, as if history itself was replaying for me along this quiet country road.

I knew the names of some of these battles, the skirmishes that peppered the Connecticut landscape - Ridgefield, Danbury, even the larger engagements further south. But today, it wasn't about specific dates or commanders. It was about the sheer courage and sacrifice of ordinary men, fighting for an ideal, on the very ground we were now traversing in the comfort of our modern automobile. It was about defending the homeland.



As we drove on, the visions slowly receded, and present-day Connecticut countryside reasserted itself. The sun began to dip towards the horizon, painting the sky in hues of orange and purple. I felt a familiar mix of pride and humility. The peace and prosperity we now enjoy are a direct result of the struggles I had just witnessed in my mind's eye. Patricia brought me back to reality as she so often does, saying, "Don't forget to turn left here." I gripped the steering wheel a little tighter, a silent promise to never forget the price of liberty, a promise kept alive by every drive through this historic and beautiful land. Just like that, we merged onto I-95 for the final leg of our journey to the friendly skies.

The Transatlantic Council of Scouting America was founded in Europe in 1950, and since then, has grown to serve families in Africa, the Middle East and Central Asia. TAC serves over 4,000 youth members and 2,000 adult volunteers in over 50 countries. The parents of about half of TAC's youth serve in the US Military overseas.

President Eisenhower shares some wonderful history with TAC. He served as the first Supreme Allied Commander Europe, and in 1954 signed a letter authorizing "manpower and logistical support" to the EUCOM Advisory Council.

TAC is very thankful and indebted to the many contributions by President Eisenhower to our country, Europe, the world and especially during TAC's formative years. Scout



Executive/CEO, Joshua Dick, looks forward to a continuous longstanding partnership with the Eisenhower Presidential Library and Museum and is very appreciative of their invitation to join in this year's D-Day commemoration.

From its earliest days, international scouting has been central to U.S. Scouting in Europe. In 1951, European Scouts joined over 18,000 Scouts from 47 nations at the 7th World Scout Jamboree in Austria. U.S. Scouts also regularly camped with British, French and German Scouts, a tradition that continues today.

TAC's signature event, the Normandy Camporee, was last held in April 2024. The French Government has designated Transatlantic Council, Scouting America, as the official "Custodians of Omaha Beach." Copy this link: (https://tacscouting.org/activities/normandycamporee/)

NORMANDY CAMPOREE

The TAC Normandy Camporee, held between 19 and 21 of April, 2024, in Normandy, France, was a significant international Scouting event that brought together over 1,400 Scouts and leaders from more than 50 troops worldwide. This was particularly meaningful, as it coincided with the 80th anniversary of D-Day, offering participants a unique opportunity to honor history while engaging in Scouting activities.

Near the Eisenhower Museum earlier this year, on a park common in Abilene, Kansas, TAC Scout Executive/CEO, Joshua Dick, delivered one of the 80 American flags flown over Normandy at that Camporee. The accompanying photos capture our KS Society Color Guard in action, led by Compatriot Color Guard Commander Bill Marshall. They retired the Eisenhower Museum flag and replaced it with flag #18 which was flown over Normandy at the 2024 TAC Normandy Camporee.

Ms. Mary Jean Eisenhower, granddaughter of President Eisenhower, along with Joshua Dick and her son, Merrill Eisenhower Atwater, walked the flag up to the flagpole and handed it over to Commander Marshall. Compatriots Bobbie Hulse and Pat Crawford raised the flag. During



the ceremony, Compatriot Bugler Bit Roberts played *Retreat*, *To The Colors* and *Revile*, while an audience of more than 200 looked on with respect.

The US Flag, presented to Mary Jean Eisenhower and the Eisenhower Presidential Library by Scout Executive/CEO Joshua Dick, flew over Omaha Beach at last year's Normandy Camporee.

Life Membership

Questions and Answers

- **1. Why should I purchase a Life Membership?** This works to your benefit because:
 - a) you are protected from inevitable future dues increases, and
 - b) you can no longer be dropped from the membership rolls for non-payment of dues (if you have bought into both the National and Kansas Life plans).
- **2.** Who can purchase a Life Membership? Any member in good standing with the SAR can purchase a National Life Membership. Any member in good standing with the Kansas Society, SAR can purchase a Kansas Life Membership, provided he has also purchased a National Life Membership.
- **3. Explain why there are two life membership plans?** All members of the SAR must remain in good standing with both the national society (NSSAR) and a state society (in this case, KSSSAR). The National Life plan pays only national dues. The Kansas Life plan pays only Kansas state dues. Participation in both plans is necessary to insure that a life member will remain in good standing.
- **4. What is the history of these life plans?** The National Life plan was created in about 1990. Past President General and KSSSAR member, Arthur Mansfield King, was influential in getting this started. About 4,500 SAR members have become National Life Members since that time. As national dues have increased, the price of a National Life Membership has changed quite a bit during this time, increasing from a flat \$500 in 1995 to a declining scale today that ranges from \$1,521 if purchased at age 1 to \$95 if purchased at age 100. If national dues are increased in the future, the price for a new life membership will most certainly be increased as well.

The Kansas plan was created in 1980, under the leadership of Dr. Phil Bernstorf. The plan paid both national and state dues, an unsound condition since the Kansas Society didn't set the amount of national dues. Under the leadership of Herrick H. "Kes" Kesler, national life



memberships were purchased by the Kansas Life Trust for all existing Kansas Life Members in 1990. Since that time, the Kansas Life Trust has been responsible for only state dues. The fee was set to a flat \$150. After the National plan was switched to a declining scale, the Kansas plan was switched to a declining scale as well. Four hundred KSSSAR members have purchased national and state life memberships. Of these, Two-hundred and seventy-five are still living with their state dues paid out of the trust. This is about 28.5% of the current Kansas Society membership.

The combined declining scale table (2025 prices) can be found on the next page.

- **5.** How much does a Life Membership cost? Consult the chart on the next page. There is no guarantee that these prices will remain in effect for long. Any future dues increase, at either the national or state level, would likely trigger a price increase for life memberships.
- **6. If I purchase a Life Membership this year, do I still have to pay 2026 dues?** No. If the payment is received before Dec. 1, 2025, the National and Kansas Life Trusts will pay your 2026 dues.
- **7. What about chapter dues?** The National Life trust only pays National dues. The Kansas Life trust only pays Kansas state dues. If you want to remain in good standing with your chapter, in most cases, you will still have to pay annual chapter dues. See your Chapter Treasurer for details.
- **8. How do I purchase a Life Membership?** Purchase online during dues renewal (credit/debit card), or contact the KSSSAR Membership Secretary, Jeffrey Winters, (if paying by check):

YOUTH PROTECTION TRAINING

fter much dedicated effort, **SAR University** launched earlier this year.

Access to this site can be found among the choices on the NSSAR front web page (sar.org). This site contains training modules for chapter and state officers and chairmen relative to their duties. In addition, a **revamped Youth Protection Module** is provided.

SAR takes the responsibility of ensuring the safety and well-being of youth who encounter our members as part of SAR sponsored activities very seriously.

Part of this is requiring periodic refreshers for members be completed to keep this topic top of mind and updating the training module periodically as new information on this topic becomes available. Such is the case in this release.

The training also requires at least an annual reminder be provided to compatriots regarding the need to complete this training. This notice delivered to all compatriots on the KSSSAR distribution represents that reminder.

WHO MUST complete this training?

At a minimum, every chapter and state officer, every chapter and state youth contest chairman, and all color guard members. This is clearly spelled out by KSSSAR and in accepting membership, you agree to abide by this requirement. Participating in a wide variety of youth-facing events (youth contests, parades, fairs, Patriot Chest, Boy Scouts, and many others) can present potential for compatriot liability, the type of which has been documented within other organizations. People who participate in such activities and who do not complete this training, as required, create potential exposure for KSSSAR and themselves.



The training format is like the past in that certain principles and examples are provided, after which a test is administered. Successful completion of this module generates the opportunity to print a personalized certificate of completion for your records. This certificate should be saved as there is currently no reprint function if the certificate becomes misplaced. You will want to avoid the possibility of needing to retake the test to print a new certificate, like I had to!

Importantly, it is the responsibility of the trainee to submit a copy of the completion certificate to the applicable people, including their chapter and state secretaries.

Please note that on the introductory page for the SAR University training selections, the national officer training chairman asks that you also send him a copy of your completion certificate (jack.b@fuse.net).

There is no central tracking system that automatically documents your completion of training and distributes the results. So, if there is no certificate on file, it can be construed that the training was **NOT** done.

Completion of this new training is valid for **THREE** years. If your prior training still has time before its two-year expiration occurs, you may continue to utilize it and take the new training when the expiration occurs. Personally, I chose to do it as a matter of being current even though I had time left.

Historically, certificates of completion are filed with the chapter and state secretaries for their documentation in an inconsistent way. This creates much uncertainty as to whether the training has been completed. As a society of responsible members of the community, it would be unfortunate to need to implement a system of "policing" compliance or require presentation of the certificate at functions to allow participation.

Please own this as a matter of your personal commitment to SAR and public trust.

Please manage by prevention. Not by reaction.

Take the course.



Send your certificate copies.

Keep compliant.

Protect our youth, yourselves, and the organization you love.

Thank you.



KSSSAR Youth Contests

The annual NSSAR Congress has just completed and we celebrate our National Finalists in the Eagle Scout and Poster Competitions.

But Kansas schools will be going back into session in August!

So, we are about to begin the youth contest cycle again.

- Each year the requirements for each contest are posted on the KSSSAR website.
- ➤ Each year an article appears in the Patriot reminding us of the contests, deadlines, and contacts.
- ➤ Each year the contest chairmen send out reminder notices by email to the chapter presidents, secretaries, or youth coordinators, depending on the contact information we have (as provided to KSSSAR and posted on the chapter portion of the KSSSAR website).

BUT each year we have situations where these various notices are not followed, and submissions are requested after posted deadlines, some of which are also not compliant with rules requirements.

Now is the time for responsible compatriots at each chapter to review the rules for the contests they sponsor. Knowing this information is chapter level responsibility. If there are uncertainties or questions needing clarification, contact the responsible state contest chairman in a timely way for assistance.

Deadlines are based on the timelines set by NSSAR for submission of state winners for national judging.

The Eagle Scout, Essay, Brochure, and Youth Video contests are judged **before** Congress and the winners selected in advance. The Oration contest is pre-judged using video entries, and six finalists are selected from these to attend and compete at Congress.

Your state contest chairmen provide the maximum amount of time possible to receive chapter winning entries and conduct state judging but often leaving themselves very little time to turn around state winning entries to National.

So, do not be surprised if a deadline is missed, that there is an inability to accommodate this. Once judging of on-time submissions has started at the state level, adding another entry to the queue is not something chairmen are likely to accept.

Of course, the sooner an entry is provided, the sooner feedback can occur to correct rules compliance issues, if present.

Please reach out if there are any questions and good luck in identifying contest candidates.

Kansas has a rich history of positive outcomes in Youth Contests, and we need all of you to support these for that legacy to continue.

COMPATRIOT FEATURE

Beginning with this Summer edition of the Liberty Bell, we are starting to highlight a compatriot in each edition who is doing remarkable volunteer work for the Kansas Society of the SAR. To kick off this new feature, there is no-one more suitable for this than Compatriot John More from the Charles Robinson Chapter in Lawrence. John serves as the chapter secretary.

I sat down with John in a noisy Olive Garden Restaurant, on 23 June of this year to learn about his background and what he brings to SAR. As so often happens in a popular restaurant, it was very quiet when we began the interview but the hostess quickly filled in the booths surrounding us, so the audio recording sounds like one of those NPR interviews where you hear the clinking and clanking of glasses, dishes and silverware in the background along with children laughing, a baby wailing and adults carrying on their own conversations.

So imagine those noises as you read about John More.

INTERVIEW EXCERPS

LB: John, why did you become a member of SAR?

John: In the late 1980's I got really interested in local history but it was more focused on Kansas history. I may have known about SAR for years but I was busy doing local historical interpretations. I've attended various events around the state of Kansas wearing period attire of four different pioneers and patriots until one SAR compatriot introduced me to SAR and invited me to investigate.

LB: What got you interested in history?

John: Getting away from the television, in my younger years. I was responsible for cleaning dishes after family meals, and one evening, I twisted the faucet so hard that it sprung a leak. Unfortunately, the family TV was nearby and got soaked, shorted out, stopped working. We couldn't afford to



buy another TV, so we started going to the library and reading books. Dad, who is a veteran, was a WWII history buff so I guess it started there, in the books.

LB: What characters do you do interpretations on?

John: Thanks to my patriot ancestor, there are now four, ranging from the 1776 period up to 1909. I'll start with the most recent and work my way back. First, there's John Selzer, a 1909 Clearfield Kansas school board member. Next is John Moore, different spelling and not related. John is an 1858 Brooklyn Kansas Livery owner in a town that was burned to the ground by Quantrell. Then in 2021, on the 200th anniversary of the Santa Fe Trail, I picked up Ezekiel Williams, an 1821 Santa Fe Trail Furrier who was born in 1776 and became known as the godfather of the Santa Fe Trail. Finally, I do my patriot ancestor, George Easton, who was a New York Militiaman living in 1776 Charlotte County.

LB: Who got you interested in SAR?

John: I was coordinating with Santa Fe Trail at the Maple Leaf Festival and met Peter Grassl. He started talking with me about my work and asked me to investigate SAR. I became a member not long after, in 2023.

LB: John has put together a nice tri-fold flyer describing his activities, and I encourage you when you see him to ask for a copy. You'll be impressed by all that he does, such as volunteering to serve with the Kansas SAR Color Guard, the Eudora Historical Society, Santa Fe Trail Association, Douglas County Chapter Board, Topeka Reformed Presbyterian Church, and Monticello Community Hospital. He is a regular participant with the SAR Color Guard in parades, honor flights, veterans funerals, the Veteran's Administration Hospital in Topeka, Wreaths Across America, and Black Jack Cabin, among many, many others. He says, "I'm having way too much fun just getting out and promoting the organization from the outside. It's where I find my most



enjoyment." He's no stranger to jumping in the car and driving long distances to perform. It's what he loves to do!

John is a self-published author, writing "American Cast Iron Desks" in 2021, "Clearfield Kansas" in 2022, "Hanging on in the Americas and Asia" in 2007, "Mom the Greatest" in 2023 and multiple church children's coloring books.

He is the youngest of two boys. His father served in the US Air Force Reserves and he has distant relations with the Beach Boys and Braum's Ice Cream. He's never been married and works his day job as a certified public accountant (CPA). He earned his bachelor's degree in accounting from the University of Kansas. Since 2023, he's been working with Michael Swisher, CPA, in Overland Park.

John occupies himself with historical programs wherever and whenever he can make it. As a child, he built model airplanes and navy ships, not cars. He lived in Monticello before it got annexed and was involved with the Monticello Historical Society. He's a member of the Presbyterian Church, the Covenanters from Scottish history.

John wrapped up our interview by leaving this bit of insight with us, "I see 2026 as a huge year for SAR and I want to be ready for it. I immersed myself during my first membership year in the color guard. I want to be ready for the 250th anniversary." Let's join him!

He added, "Volunteerism is worth the effort you want to put into it." You may see John show up at various flag waving events across the area. He loves the US flag and feels that it needs to be displayed more.







Beware of the continuing legacy which you carry as a

Son of the American Revolution.

Remembering General George Washington's farewell message to his most trusted officers in Fraunces Tavern on the evening of 4 December 1783, Colonel Benjamin Talmadge recorded in his memoirs that the General said, "With a heart full of love and gratitude, I now take leave of you. I most devoutly wish that your latter days may be as prosperous and happy as your former ones have been glorious and honorable. I cannot come to each of you but shall feel obliged if each of you will come and take me by the hand."

During his Farewell Orders to the Army, a little over a month earlier, the General acknowledged their achievements, commended the Army with high praise, expressed his personal gratitude, called for unity and order, expressed his fervent wish for future prosperity and gave them a moving farewell.

Then, after a brief 4-year hiatus as a farmer, he was called back into service once again, this time to preside over the Constitutional Convention and to ultimately become our first President in 1789. May we do well to follow the General's example.
